WOA Becomes an Observer at OIV



In November, the Wine Origins Alliance (WOA) was granted observer status at the International Organization of Vine and Wine (OIV), which was announced at the OIV World Congress in Ensenada, Mexico. The OIV strives to set standards and harmonize practices for the viticultural sector. Two Mexican Regions Join WOA



At the OIV World Congress in Mexico, the Wine Origins Alliance welcomed two new members: Comité Provino Baja California and Cluster Vitivinícola de Querétaro. These organizations represent the first WOA members from Mexico and expands WOA to 33 organizations, spanning 11 countries across five continents.

Meet Our New Member: Querétaro



Querétaro is Mexico's primary sparkling wine-producing region. The Querétaro region has an extensive wine history, as their first vines were planted in 1531. Sitting at an altitude of 2,000 meters (6,562 feet) above sea level, winegrowers in the region experience "extreme viticulture" in a semi-desertic climate, with temperatures reaching up to 35°C (95°F). Meet Our New Member: Baja California



Baja California includes a collection of winegrowing valleys situated between 18 and 25 Kilometers (11.2 and 15.5 miles) from the Pacific Ocean: Valle de Tanamá, Valle de Las Palmas, Valle de San Valentín, Valle de Guadalupe, Valle de Ojos Negros, Valle de La Grulla, Valle de Santo Tomás, and Valle de San Vincente. Each valley has its own unique characteristics, including different soil composition, water availability and microclimates.
